These charts rank all Tennessee schools on how effective they are in raising individual student achievement. They are based on data from the Tennessee Value-Added Assessment System (TVAAS), the nation's most sophisticated accountability system. TVAAS was pioneered at the University of Tennessee and implemented by the Tennessee Department of Education in 1992.

Seven schools in Johnson City and Washington County are among the highest performers in the state:

Elementary Schools

- Boones Creek Elementary (ranked at #5 out of 755)
- Towne Acres Elementary (ranked at #100 out of 755)
- Woodland Elementary (ranked at #106 out of 755)

Middle/K-8 Schools

- University School (ranked at #4 out of 531)
- Fall Branch Elementary (ranked at #6 out of 531)
- Indian Trail Middle (ranked at #11 out of 531)
- West View School (ranked at #93 out of 531)

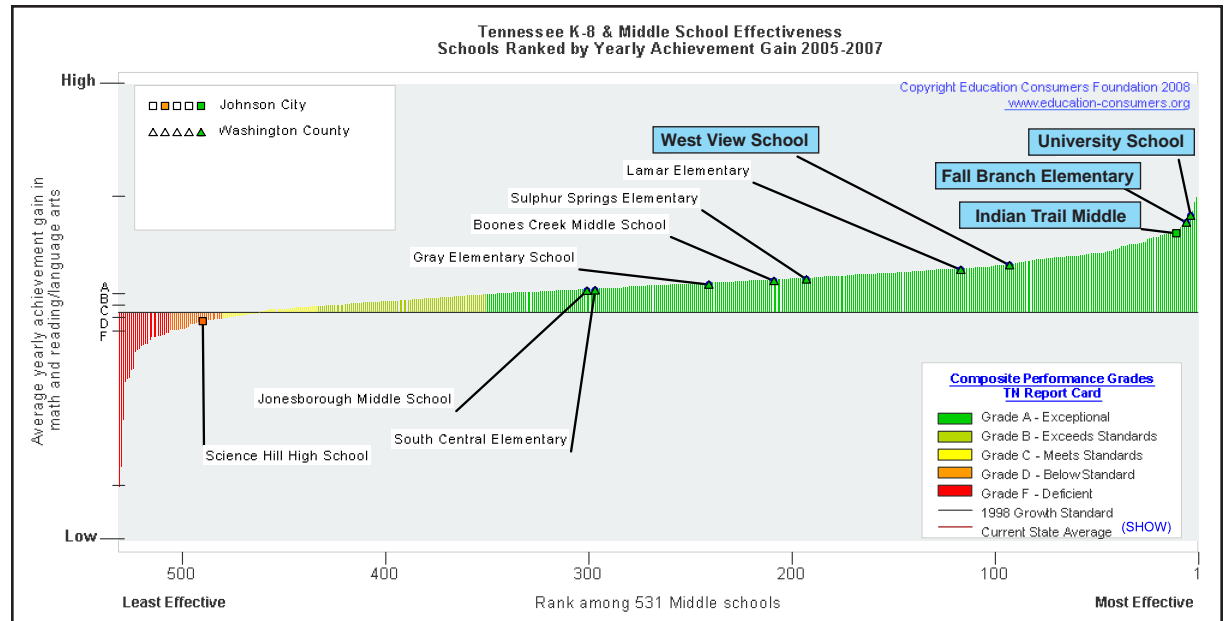
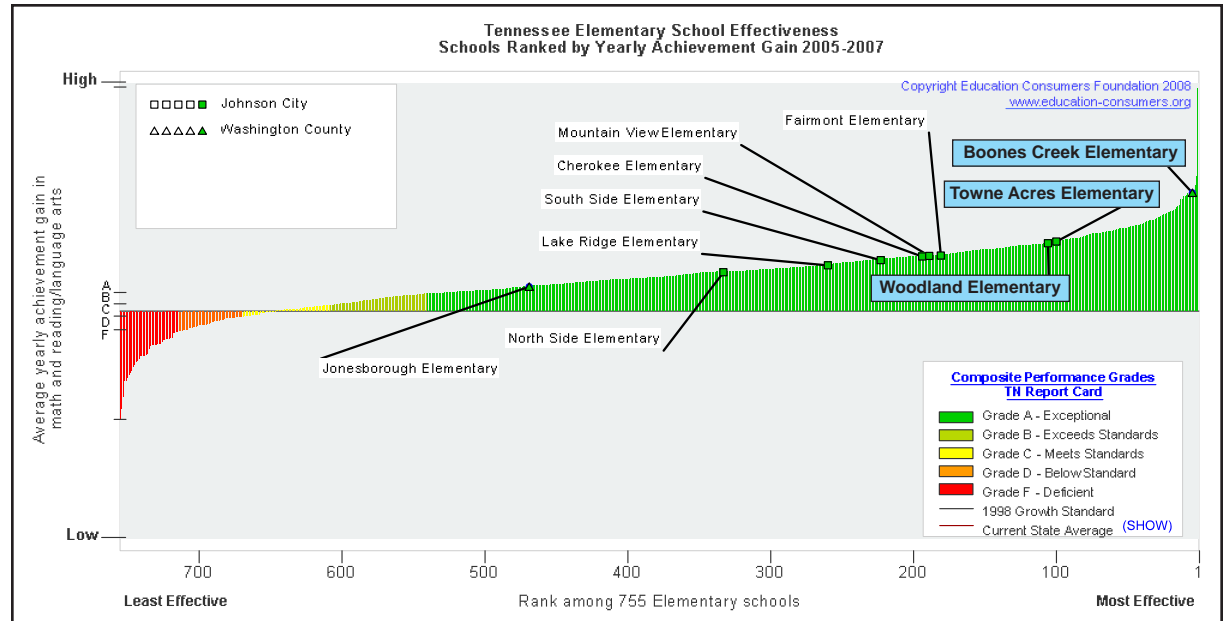
They will each receive a certificate recognizing them as a "Most Effective School in 2008" from the Education Consumers Foundation, a nonprofit organization dedicated to serving the interests of education's consumers. Please join us in recognizing their accomplishment.

TVAAS is now a national model--adopted by Ohio and Pennsylvania and recommended by the U.S. Department of Education. Achievement test averages and other indicators are often used as measures of school quality but none are as important as TVAAS scores. They show how much each school is helping its students "be all they can be."
